With its freedom of thought and religious practice, Masonry would have been very appealing to Jefferson.

Clues to whether Jefferson was a Mason may be found in some of his letters, of which he wrote some 20,000, many of which still exist and have been published in recent years and separated by subject matter.

One of these letters was written to William Short on October 31, 1819. In this letter, Jefferson writes, "Virtue consists in 1. Prudence. 2. Temperance. 3. Fortitude. 4. Justice." This is exactly what we learn in the Entered Apprentice Degree.

In the Declaration of Independence, written by Jefferson, near the end are these words, "...with a firm reliance on Devine Providence..." These words are almost identical to what is found at the end of the Master Mason Degree.

In another letter, written to Thomas J. Smith, he writes, "Adore God,love your neighbor as yourself, and your country more than life. Be just; be true...." Again, very Masonic type thoughts.

If Thomas Jefferson was not a Mason in the flesh so to speak, he certainly was in spirit. Incidentally, Abraham Lincoln had a great respect for Masonry and wanted to join but never did; and Ronald Reagan was recognized by Masonic groups for exemplifying Masonic principles and had a great respect for the institution. INTRODUCTION



Daniel Carter Beard

Many Freemasons nationwide have been of great service to the Boy Scouts of America by supporting the development of Scouting units, serving as volunteers, and assisting their Masonic lodges in forming and sponsoring Scout units. The relationship between individual Masons and Scouting, which has existed since the founding of Scouting in America, has resulted in immeasurable benefits for both Freemasonry and Scouting.

At the June 2001 Quarterly Communication of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, the Grand Master approved the creation of the Daniel Carter Beard Masonic Scouter Award.

It was created with the approval of the Boy Scouts of America as a national Masonic Scouter award, and will be administered by the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania as a service to all other regular Grand Lodges.

The Daniel Carter Beard Masonic Scouter Award is an honor due to the countless Freemasons who practice the ideals of Freemasonry and act as role models to the young men who are part of one of our nation's most outstanding youth organizations. The Daniel Carter Beard Masonic Award not only supports the Masonic relationship through the man who brought Scouting to America, but proclaims the integrity of the Freemason who is honored by receiving the award.

MASONIC CONNECTIONS TO THE BOY SCOUT PROGRAM

In the early 1900's, as editor of "Recreation" magazine, Daniel Carter Beard wrote a monthly article for youth. In 1905, he started the program promoting Boy Pioneering, called "The Sons of Daniel Boone". When he changed jobs a bit later, he changed the name of the organization to "Boy Pioneers of America" and was known as the Grand Master Woodcraftsman of the organization. At the same time in England, Lord Robert Baden Powell began passing along his pioneering and military skills that he learned through the British Military in a new program he called "Boy Scouts". In 1907, William Boyce, a Chicago publisher paid a visit to England and on a night where he needed assistance and directions, a young man wearing a neckerchief came to his aid, and when offered a tip for his assistance, he refused, stating that Boy Scouts do not take money for doing good deeds. This single act left such a deep impression on Boyce that he vowed to find out more about this program and to bring it to the USA. When the Boy Scouts of America was founded in 1910, the organizations (BSA and Boy Pioneers of America) were merged and Daniel Carter Beard served for thirty years as one of its original National Scout Commissioners. As brother Beard was a Freemason in a New York State lodge, a BSA award for Masons today is named in his honor.

Today the program has adapted to the times and merit badges such as "Computers" and "Cinematography" now join basic scout skills of Citizenship, First Aid and the like. Training in areas such as youth protection and safe activities are now stressed more than ever and the search for responsible trained leaders is as needed now as it ever was. As the values of our society decline, the number of men that live their lives by the rule and square (basically Masonic values) are harder to find – especially those with the character sufficient to put their values to work by making a difference in the community. Today, positions for Scouters are needed to be filled at about every level of the BSA, but each position differs in its roles and responsibilities. Today, here in Northridge District (the New Michigan Council area here where NAC #551 is located), a shortage of Unit Commissioners is currently experienced. The role of a Unit Commissioner only takes about two nights a month, yet finding good men to fill those roles is currently a challenge. The role of a Unit Commissioner is that as the District Representative of a unit, who assists the unit with its rechartering, conveys information from the District to the Unit and back, and serves as a friend to the unit, to encourage his units' leaders to get trained, etc. More information on that position is available from Brother Roy Prince, or via an Internet search. Bottom line, our community doesn't care how much you know until they know how much you care. There are many prospective Masons in the scout and scouter ranks that we need to reach out to. Brother Don Metzler reached out in this arena, and due to his efforts, a number of scouter masons have been raised in Oakland County lodges (I am one, and know others) and if we don't make the first step to serve with them in Scouting, they probably won't be serving with us in Masonry either. Brothers – look inside yourselves and see if you can find the spirit of Brother Daniel Carter Beard within. If we don't make a stand to steer the values of the next generation, other less worthy organizations will, and we won't like the outcome! The first Wednesday of the month is the Northridge District Commissioner's meeting – please let me know if you'd like to join me and I'll provide all details, and can even drive!
