Navy Vet Brother John Walford visits WWII Memorial

Brother John Walford P.M., a Navy veteran of WWII, recently flew to Washington D.C. to visit the new World War II Memorial thanks to the local charity, Honor Flight Michigan. Honor Flight Michigan is the brainchild of Royal Oak insurance agent Dave Cameron of State Farm, himself a Navy veteran.

Cameron's mission with Honor Flight is to fly any and all Michigan WWII veterans to Washington D.C. to visit the recently completed WW II Memorial, built some 60 years after the war ended. The cost for each person is about \$300, all inclusive, with no cost to the veteran. Cameron and his dedi-

cated staff of Honor Flight volunteers raise all of the money through contributions from the community. As Cameron told the veterans, "This trip is to honor you. You saved the world" Our organization is here to show you the love and respect that you deserve."

The problem is the age of most of the veterans. Many veterans will never have the opportunity to see the Memorial as more than 1600 pass away each day nationally. Bro. Walford, at age 82, quipped that he was the youngest veteran on the recent flight. Due to the age of the veterans and their infirmities, each group of three veterans is accompanied by a guardian. By good fortune, Bro. Walford's granddaughter, Elizabeth Elaquiere, was able to accompany John on the trip as one of the guardians due to Honor Flight's need for a doctor or nurse on the flight. Elizabeth, a registered nurse, volunteered to fill this spot.

So far over 200 veterans have made the journey that begins with a 4:00 a.m. departure and ends with a 9:00 p.m. return the same day. It's a long and arduous day that starts with a bus ride to Metro airport, a full breakfast and then a flight to Baltimore. A motor coach then whisks the group to Arlington National Cemetery where tram takes the veterans on a tour through the cemetery and then to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier to watch the very moving Changing of the Guard. The veterans are treated to a box lunch before departing for the WWII Memorial. After having time to visit the Memorial it's back to the airport for the journey home to Michigan.

One veteran called it "the trip of a lifetime". Bro. Walford said it was a great honor for him to go on this trip. The Lodge felt grateful that Bro. John served his country. Northwood Ancient

Craft donated \$500 to Honor Flight Michigan to cover his expenses and as a tribute to our dearly departed Brother Bob Jones P.M., a WWII veteran, who had planned to make the trip. John wore a Navy hat given to him by his nephew and, of course, his Masonic bolo tie. Bro. John had the good fortune to also visit with his other granddaughter, Gina Vitella, a Washington D.C. attorney, who met him at the Memorial.

Bro. John served in the U.S. Navy from 1943-46 or as he says "three years, 11 months and 4 days". After training at Great Lakes, Bro John was stationed at a

Naval Air Station in Patuxent River, N.J.


Bro. Walford joined Masonry in September of 1957 after talking with a neighbor he had seen in Masonic regalia on occasion. One question led to another and then to the E.A. initiation. Brother John was Worshipful Master in 1967 and then again in 1986. He helped found the Past masters Unit in 1970.

Bro. John related that it was a lot tougher to become a Master Mason in the era when he joined the Craft. All work had to be learned orally from a Brother Mason. Ritual was not written out in a manual as it is today. One had to complete his Master Mason proficiency before he could take an officers position. Once you became W.M., you had to know and memorize all of the Degree work, the charges, and the lectures. You were expected to deliver funeral and grave side services which might entail taking a day off from work. He said meetings were staid and business-like and chuckled that "the Brothers watched your every word and were quick to point out your errors."

Bro. John said that has enjoyed every minute of his almost 50 years of Masonry. He really enjoys the Degree work and is a member of the South Oakland Degree Team, taking the part of King Solomon on numerous occasions. He relishes the friendship and camaraderie. He related a story of meeting a Mason and his wife while in San Diego. The couple, having only just met John and his wife, invited them to visit anytime and stay at their home....whenever they wanted and for as long as they wanted. As John said, "what other group inspires this type of trust when you meet someone for the first time?"

Bro John has lived in Royal Oak with his wife Betty for 55 years. They have two daughters and a son and 7 grandchildren.
